PETER F. HURLEY

Music from a band frightened a team of horses. They bolted towards the children.

Pete managed to turn the team into a side street and averted what might have been a tragedy for many children.

Pete is the proud father of 6 daughters and a son, and he has 10 grandchildren, the last born on June 26, 1965.
Retirement will pose no problem of ennui for him—his family will keep him well occupied for many years to come.

Pete's many friends at IEEE will miss his cheery greeting and courteous attention. On any occasion, we have been able to call on Pete to write an appropriate poem marking special events in Staff Headquarters. Christmas parties, retirements, the merger operations, and remembrance of our days at 79th Street were all grist for his lively pen. It is hoped that he will continue to write after he leaves the Institute.

ACCOUNTING DEPARTMENT SUMMED UP

The Accounting Department serves as the financial center of IEEE. Its functions affect every department in some degree.

One of the prime functions of this department is the collecting and recording of financial transactions, the preparation of reports, and the comparison of those financial transactions with predetermined standards.

To those unfamiliar with the workings of the Accounting Dept., it appears to be a tiring and unexciting task of adding and subtracting numbers with little variation or excitement, but this is not the case. Here lies the total picture of how the operations of each department, as well as the economic, social, and governmental influences, affect us.

Angie Rodriquez is our control over the payments made by IEEE. She not only verifies that an invoice made to the Institute is mathematically correct, she also verifies that proper approval has been received and that the item has not been previously paid. She then determines the department the expense is to be charged against. After final review by Tom Bartlett, the Accounting Manager, the invoice is passed to Olga Castro for preparation of the check and actual expense distribution to be made on our Burroughs Sensamatic. All payments are crossfiled numerically and alphabetically to facilitate future researching requirements. Both of these capable girls keep a watchful eye on the balance in our checking account. Everyone with a checking account will appreciate the problems these two overcome handling 2,000 checks each month.

Mary Gee handles the important assignment of processing over two million dollars received annually in payments from advertisers and convention exhibitors.

Larry Pomatto (of softball team fame) handles all of the Group financial accounting including the detailed analysis of all publication costs and distributions. If you wish to know how much a magazine costs, Larry is the one to call.

The final collection and coordination of all financial information and the recording on the official records of the Institute fall to Ed Morley, our accountant. The important task here is to present the results of operations in a concise and forceful manner to highlight the out-of-pattern situations on troublesome events.

This by no means completes the duties and responsibilities of the department. There are government reports, tax returns, special financial reports and studies, correspondence and records to be maintained of all of the physical assets of the Institute. All of these require typing and the final personal touch of Arlene Ferrero, Secretary to the Accounting Manager.

THE GOURMET

What's something special for a summer dinner-for-four-that treats the cook as a guest? To be really special, the main dish is best hot; yet the kitchen and the cook must stay cool! Impossible? Not quite. Serve this easy veal gourmet deluxe with a tossed green salad (no cucumber or tomato) and crusty continental bread; or with buy-them-in-a-box scalloped potatoes, following package directions.

''Kalb's Kotlett mit Sauerer Sahne''

4 - 6 veal cutlets, preferably thick

1 clove garlic

1 egg

2 tablespoons water

1 cup breadcrumbs

½ cup shortening (liquid or not)

2 teaspoons paprika


1/2 cup sliced onion

½ cup sour cream

1 lemon (or equivalent juice)

1 tablespoon minced parsley

Rub veal thoroughly with sliced garlic; dip into egg and water mixture, then into breadcrumbs till coated. Melt shortening and mix in paprika. Brown onions in shortening-paprika mixture, push to side and brown meat. Arrange onions on meat. Spoon in sour cream, cover and cook in 350° oven for ½ hour. Just before serving, sprinkle with lemon juice and parsley. Total meal preparation time? Forty-five minutes!
