PROFILE

Since this is our first profile on what we hope will be a series, we have chosen a personality whom we think is a most unusual man, with an amazing past and present.



Dr. George W. Bailey was born in Quincy, Massachusetts on May 14, 1887, and graduated from Adams Academy in 1903, and from Harvard in 1907, where he was Treasurer of his class.

We could list chronologically the various posts he holds and has held, and the numerous organizations he heads and directed, but that would only reflect a rather flat image, and Dr. Bailey goes deeper than that. Besides, the "facts" can be found in "Who's Who" copies of which are available to the public. This article will concern itself with Dr. George Bailey, the man that we at IEEE have come to know and respect.

Dr. Bailey joined the IRE staff in 1945 as Executive Secretary. It is significant, we feel, that the great strides in expansion occurred coincidently with his acceptance of that position. In 1945, IRE membership totaled 13,000. When IRE merged with AIEE, the membership total was approximately 100,000.

Those who work with Dr. Bailey never hesitate to consult him on their problems, and never fail to walk away satisfied. His quick mind grasps the essence of the problem and inevitably comes up with the solution. And of course there is always a little anecdote that draws a parallel and a laugh.

Words fall short, when trying to describe the essence of the character of one who has impressed his associates to the degree that Dr. Bailey has impressed us. It will have to suffice therefore, to recognize Dr. George Bailey for all the ways in which he has endeared himself to those of us who

are fortunate enough to know him, and to further say that through his presence and leadership we have all gained in some way.

THE GOURMET

A spring-chicken treat--elegant enough for that special rendez-vous, simple enough for every day dinner--is Chicken Mandarin. For 2 to 3:

1 3-lb chicken (broiler or fryer, cut in 4 pieces)

Flour

1/2 teaspoon paprika

1/4 to 1/2 cup butter or margarine

l can frozen tangerine juice, allowed to
thaw (takes about 15 minutes)

1 8-oz. can Mandarin orange sections Wash chicken and pat dry. Dredge in flourpaprika mixture. Meanwhile, heat butter in frying pan; brown chicken till golden. Place browned chicken on rack in baking dish, pour any remaining butter from frying pan over it, and place in preheated 375° oven. After 10 minutes, pour tangerine juice over the chicken Baste occasionally until chicken is tender-about 45 minutes, depending on your oven. Pour drained Mandarin orange sections over chicken and warm 3 or 4 minutes more. Serve with rice pilaf and a fresh green salad.

For that very special evening, soak a linch square of bread in cointreau and place in center of chicken, allowing some of the liquid to run over the meat, set a match to it, and bring it to the table aflame!

THRU THE KEYHOLE

Down three steps, off the busy street into the little Armenian Restaurant with the red canopy, a menu of intriguing foods further increased our appetites.

Entrees, very reasonably priced, featured lamb and rice dishes at the Izmir, 121 Lexington Avenue between 28th and 29th St. Soup, salads, a la carte dinners, olive oil dishes, wines and beer (including Greekbeer) and desserts, were served at this clean eating place.

Kouzou Dolma, made with Izmir pilaf (rice) with currants, pine nuts, and topped with chunks of baked lamb was very satisfying. Patlijan Karni Yarik was a delicious portion of eggplant filled with lamb. The oven-baked dish was prepared with onions, pine nuts, and tomato.

One of the olive oil dishes served at the Izmir was Midia Dolma, mussels in the shell stuffed with rice, chopped onions and other spices. A delicious crispy, green salad prepared with special oil dressings is also to be recommended. Shish Kebab is one of the favorites of the customers there, we were told

For dessert, Paklava, a pastry covered with fine shredded dough, filled with walnuts and covered with a honey syrup, or Tell Kadayiff, a special home made dough with a similar honey syrup preparation was a delightful finish to the dinner.

After a demitasse of sweet tasting, Armenian coffee, we left the small restaurant, tucked away from the usual maddening rush and crowds of the city, pleased that we had made a real find in the eating world.
